With the delivery of this magazine you should also have received a letter regarding stewardship. This is something the Church of Scotland say we must do every three years.

You will realize how your own costs rise annually and the church is no different. If our church is going to continue its witness and activity in our parish we require our membership to support it financially.

Our church has also changed its constitution to a Unitary Constitution. The main difference this will bring is that we can now dispense with the Congregational Board and our Kirk Session will be responsible for all matters spiritual and temporal.

The Kirk Session now have powers to co-opt anyone from the congregation or outside it to assist them with particular tasks, provided the person selected is willing to do so.

The Kirk Session has been divided into four committees who will be given powers to act up to certain limits set by the Kirk Session. These are Stewardship & Finance, Fabric, Mission & Outreach, Fund Raising & Events and Administration. This should speed up decision making and make the Kirk Session more efficient.

The buildings at Dalmilling are now being used much more by community groups and it is good to see the church being seen again as at the centre of the community. There is a buzz about the place again. This gives us the opportunity to tell the good news of Jesus to those who come in and out our buildings and there are many ways in which we can do this. To help with this task our Fabric Committee under the able leadership of Gwyn Williams is doing sterling work. The Dalmilling buildings have been neglected over the years and we are now starting a process of refurbishment.

This has been a busy year in the church. Much has happened. Unfortunately there is no sign of interest from ministers who might apply to lead you. You are not alone! More than 200 churches are in the same position. We must continue to work for the Lord during this time of vacancy. We need all members who are reasonably fit and able to



play an active part in this process. If you have not been doing this I implore you to think again and help us with our tasks.

When you are busy time seems to fly and this year has seen that happen from my point of view.

Christmas is just around the corner with all the clutter the modern Christmas Season brings.

In the Church let us not forget the wonder of what is at the heart of Christmas, the wonder of God coming down to earth to reveal himself to us and to save us from ourselves. I hope that those who are fit will make attendance at our Christmas services and events a priority.

I pray that you and yours will have a happy and peaceful Christmas and that you will celebrate your faith within the family we call the church.


I thank my bowlers for being so faithful and helpful to me. Thanks especially to Ian and David who arrange for heating and helping to set out the mats.



FUNERARY HATCHMENT

During the period of roof repair work and subsequent refurbishment at Auchincruive, two large (more than 5ft in height) canvasses were very much in our way. They were regarded as very old and "something" to do with the Oswald Family.

These have now been identified as Funerary Hatchments.

A Funerary Hatchment is a depiction within a black lozenge-shaped frame, generally on a black background, of a deceased's heraldic achievement showing the family arms and crest together with indications of the supporters of the person and family.

The word Hatchment is a corrupted version of the word 'achievement'.

Hatchments were usually placed over the entrance of a deceased nobleman's residence and displayed for a period between 40 days and a year, after which they were removed to the local church. The practice developed in the early seventeenth century from the custom of carrying an heraldic shield before the coffin of the deceased.

The items on the shields correspond with images on the Oswald and Haldane families. Two of the "occupants" of our crypt and likely candidates for these Hatchments, are Richard Oswald (1705-1784) known as the Peacemaker after his work in writing the peace treaty which eventually ended the American War of Independence and Alexander Haldane Oswald (1811-1868), MP for Ayrshire 1843-1852.

This was remedied in 1975 when the Hall extension opened.

As you will see from reports in the magazine there are also the Bowlers, Friendship Group and Sewing Corner using the halls. Other groups include War Games, Wild Rhythm Group and U-NIQ café.

WHO IS MY NEIGHBOUR?



Last month found me cycling, one rainy morning, in the rush hour in Perth. I was in a hurry and, trying to be clever, was undertaking a queue of cars waiting at the traffic lights. I misjudged my path through a puddle, hit the pavement edge, and landed; sprawled across my bike, face down on the concrete!

In the split second between realising what had just happened and wondering if I was going to be able to get up again, I saw three things. The first was that all the car drivers drove off. The second was a teenage lass at the nearby bus stop who looked up from her phone, glanced at me and immediately looked back down at her phone; and the third was an Asian man in his 20s, behind her in the bus queue, who started towards me, looking anxiously to see if I was ok or needed help.

It made me think, as in the parable, how important it is, and how much it matters, to be the kind of person who, without being asked, will come forward immediately to help someone in trouble, regardless of differences, and even if it might be an inconvenience, just because it is the right thing to do.

(I was OK. Just a bruised knee, an acute case of embarrassment and a valuable lesson in safe cycling learned!)

I'm in discussion with one of the Community Workers, Paul Ageo, about setting up a class for local lades to make Canny Cookers (a kind of well padded fabric container which can keep food hot without using energy, so keeping costs down) and I'm waiting to hear back from Seascape about the possibility of having some of the Syrian refugee ladies from Monkton over to do some sewing.




