TREASURER'S REPORT

CHURCH MAGAZINE, DECEMBER 2021

Things are still proving difficult for us financially. We are still not seeing increased numbers attending church with the resulting drop in our free will offering envelopes. We have however managed to exceed our Income Budget by 48% and even allowing for the Legacies received of £6,000, we are still 25% over Budget. It should be remembered tho.' that the budget was set during lockdown and we didn't know how things might progress.

However we are also over Budget on our Expenditure by 1% this year. The total effect of this is that we are slightly down this year compared to last hear but it would have been down £6,287 if not for the Legacies. Unless things were to change dramatically, we will find it difficult to keep things going looking ahead. Our Bank balance has however remained pretty constant but would have reduced by 22% if not for the aforementioned legacies.

We can only hope and pray that somehow things will get better over the next year or so.

These are short excerpts from a book called 'Revelations of Divine Love' written by a nun, Sister Julian of Norwich in the 1300s.

You might already know a quotation from this book "All shall be well, and all shall be well, and all manner of things shall be well"

Here she compares God's love for us, to that of a mother for her child.

" God, the supreme wisdom of all, made himself ready in this humble



place and dressed himself in our poor flesh, himself to perform the service and office of motherhood in everything. The mother's service is closest, most willing and most sure; closest because it is most natural, most willing because it is most loving, and most sure because it is true."

"And when he had finished, and so given birth to us into bliss, not even this could satisfy his marvellous love; and he revealed that in these exaltedly surpassing words of love: 'If I could suffer more, I would suffer more.'

"The kind loving mother who knows and recognizes the needs of her child protects it very tenderly as the nature and condition of motherhood requires. And as the child grows older she changes her method but not her love. And when it is grown up more, she allows it to be chastised to break down vices so as to make the child gain in virtues and grace."

"But often when our failing and our wretchedness are shown to us, we are so afraid and so greatly ashamed of ourselves that we hardly know where to put ourselves. But then, our courteous mother does



not want us to flee away" "But he wants us to behave like a child; for when it is upset or frightened it runs quickly to its mother for help as fast as it can." "And if we do not feel ourselves helped straightaway, let us be sure he is behaving like a wise mother; for if he sees that it would be more to our advantage for us to mourn and to weep, he allows that with pity and compassion until the right moment, out of love."

"It is his role to save us, it is his glory to do this, and it is his wish that we know it; for he wants us to love him kindly and trust in him humbly and strongly. And he revealed this (to Julian) in these gracious words: 'I am keeping you very safe,' "

(I was talking to John about this book today, and it turned out he knows it well and wrote about it during his training! I read it recently and am now reading it again. It's an amazingly inspiring book and, as John thought too, sometimes you read something in it and the light suddenly comes on!! I think she was a bit ahead of her time and quite a woman!)

In my last wee article, I wrote about my early interest in cycling and the sense of freedom and independence it gave me and stayed with me all through my life right up to the present day.

I am fortunate to live by the coast here in
Barassie, which is a popular seaside destination with
day-trippers, easily reached by car or train from
Glasgow, it is also a Mecca for Wind and Kite Surfers
and more recently, the latest sport of Paddle Boarding, as the North
Shore is clean, safe, and quite shallow for a long way out. There is
also no shortage of wind!.



The Route 7 cycle path which runs from Carlisle to Inverness passes along the Seafront, is flat and popular with folks exercising, especially during lockdown. This path carries on over the border into North Ayrshire and makes its way through the Woodland Trust Shewalton Nature Reserve, home to

three powerful Clydesdales –Tommy, April, and her daughter Chrystal - who always enjoy a carrot or two from my bag.

On the way there I pass over a level crossing on a siding from the Ayr – Kilmarnock railway line which was one of the first commercial railway tracks in Britain – laid by the Duke of Portland to transport coal in horse drawn wagons from Kilmarnock to Troon Harbour and then shipped to Ireland.

Behind the track is a busy Sawmill with a yard stacked full of giant hardwood tree trunks about to be stripped of their bark and processed through the Sawmill into hard to-get timber products for the Building Trade. The Bark and Sawdust are collected into large containers and sent for MDF Board production. On the siding there



are 15 Tanker Wagons containing a white chemical used in Paper production in the Giant Paper Mill 250 yards along the road. It is a colossal white, windowless building, which more resembles a giant cargo ship with steam pouring from its chimneys. This is from their own Power Station which supplies the Mill utilizing waste from the timber used in Paper production.



I turn right into the wooded area passing another huge factory complex with its two ginormous Windmills which can be seen for miles around supplying power to the Beecham's Pharmaceutical Products Factory. I recross the railway and passing the stacks of the giant tree trunks in the Sawmill yard it makes me wonder where they come from, what kind of trees they were, how long did it take to get to that size? At home, the current COP 26 conference in Glasgow and the associated Climate Change discussions on the vital role Trees play in Carbon Capture to help prevent Global

Warming, made me think on our local situation.




I realized that most people think of Troon as a quiet seaside town and not as a major Timber processing center which contributes to our local economy. But in addition to the Sawmill and Giant Paper Mill mentioned above, we also have on the Harbour site, originally used to export coal to Ireland, a home to a bustling Marina, and a small Fishing Fleet, which is now overshadowed by a large and ever-expanding Timber processing operation. This utilizes timber from forests in the West of Scotland and beyond, brought in



by lorry for the manufacture of House frames, Pallets and all types and sizes of cut Timber for the Building and Joinery Trades. Further supplies arrive in the harbour by Cargo Boats and by Barge towed direct from the island of Arran. Business seems to be booming as Timber products are in short supply in the wake of the pandemic. Prices have never been higher.

I was aware that growing trees store Carbon and are essential for our planet, but only recently learned that any Carbon stored is released into the atmosphere when the tree is cut down! I know that through the ages Timber has been, and is a useful and valuable resource, but with the advent of bigger and more modern machinery, it is disappearing fast, and it is essential that it is managed properly Worldwide. What price an even bigger hole in the Ozone Layer???



We also held several Zoom sessions which were great fun, and a good way to feel we'd all 'seen' each other. We had Virtual Sleepovers and parties on Zoom, and Girlguiding Scotland held online events for all Units to watch such as a 'Christmas Panto' and 'Spring Social'.









soon as we saw the Brownies' smiling faces and heard their chatter and chuckles, it seemed worthwhile. It's been a learning curve for all the leaders, and things are a little different, such as the girls sitting further apart than usual, and we're choosing games that minimise close contact or touching. But so far it seems to be going well.



Here is a game we played this week, it's called WHO AM I?

All the girls stand up. One Brownie is chosen and she thinks about another Brownie but doesn't tell anyone who it is. She then starts to describe the Brownie, and if the description doesn't match anyone they have to sit down eg "The Brownie I'm thinking of has dark hair" – if any Brownies don't have dark hair, they sit down; "The Brownie I'm thinking of is wearing trainers" and so on, until only one girl is left standing – the girl the Brownie was originally thinking of!

22 **COP 26**



In the first week of September the world watched on as World Leaders flew in to take part in COP 26. On day 1 we had Boris Johnson, David Attenborough, Prince Charles and many other leaders detailing their thoughts and asking for commitments to see change happen. Some pledges were made.

- ⇒ To halt and reverse deforestation by 2030.
- ⇒ To cut methane emissions.
- ⇒ To commit to helping poorer countries to decarbonise coal energy systems.
- ⇒ To phase out and stop investing in coal power systems.
- ⇒ Many countries have already signed up to being net zero by 2050 but some are now saying this will not be possible till 2060 or 2070.

More emotive were speeches of Activists. One Samoan activist told how low lying Pacific islands such as Samoa and Tuvalu are in danger due to rising oceans. They have a low carbon footprint and are amongst the lowest contributors to global pollution however they are the ones paying the price of climate change.

Another told of the effect climate change is having on those of indigenous people of the Amazon forests whose way of life is being destroyed due to deforestation. For these people 2030 is too late.

It is not just Pacific Islands that are in danger. Only today (8th November) there was a report on the morning news from an area of Wales at risk of coastal flooding and population displacement. However we have the resources both financially and materially to build flood defences which will delay but possibly not stop the inevitable loss of land with rising sea levels

Over the weekend there were demonstrations and marches by Activists both young and old. Greta Thunberg has given speeches



and interviews calling the youth of today to action with her war cry of 'blah,blah,' She has already stated that COP 26 will be regarded as a failure.

In the second week Environment, Climate and Energy ministers will start negotiations to see how all of this can be achieved and financed. Contributions are being promised to help vulnerable communities to respond to climate change.

On Wednesday the theme is transport and the switch to electric vehicles. One of the goals of COP 26 is to try and accelerate this switch.

- ⇒ As one of the Glasgow Breakthroughs at the World Leader Summit, 30 countries have agreed to work together to make zero emission vehicles the new normal by making them accessible, affordable, and sustainable in all regions by 2030 or sooner.
- ⇒ Nineteen governments have also stated their intent to support the establishment of 'green shipping corridors' – zero-emission shipping routes between two ports. This will involve deploying zero-emission vessel technologies and putting alternative fuel and charging infrastructure in place in ports to allow for zero emission shipping on key routes across the globe.
- ⇒ The UK has pledged to shift to clean trucks by committing to end the sale of most new diesel trucks between 2035 and 2040.

However it remains to be seen as some manufacturers have not committed to this. There is also a large workforce training scheme still required to train mechanics in servicing and maintaining electric vehicles.
