

Molly Blackwood was a much loved member of the St Quivox church family. For sixty years she served faithfully in the church, carrying out many duties, whether as a member of the Congregational Board or as a co-opted member of the Kirk Session, and even when she was unable to be attend the meetings she maintained an interest in how things were going. Molly was involved in nearly every aspect of church life, helping out and supporting all the various coffee mornings, church fetes and other church fundraisers that were organised throughout the years.

And it was as a small sign of our gratitude for all that she had done that the church presented her with a long service certificate at the end of 2022, just after she had come out of hospital.

However, committed as she was to the church, nothing was more important to Molly than her family, and they remained the main focus in her life.

Although she had known times of tragedy, Molly tended not to dwell upon them, instead she believed that life was for living in the here and now, because you couldn't turn back time.

She always wanted the best for her family, whether that be for her son Ian and his family or her various nieces and nephews and their families.

Over the last 10 months or so Molly was in and out of hospital where she still managed to overcome the odds and return home.

Unfortunately, her last battle with illness was one too many. And whilst she is no longer with us, just like so many others, she leaves behind a legacy that will ensure that she will never be forgotten.

We are grateful to everyone involved for making these events the successes they are and for also enabling the church to be a symbol of good in the area, but perhaps more importantly it allows those with no church connection to see inside the big building at the corner of Dalmilling Road and Thornyflat Road!!

As usual our Easter day started with an outdoors service. This year we were in the church at Auchincruive on a cold but dry day. We had a short sermon, prayer and sang a couple of hymns from Mission Praise. This was followed by breakfast in the church.

Our normal service then started at 10:30am followed by more tea/coffee and cakes. We do like time to socialise after the service.

We recently started a new faith based programme called Keys to Freedom, which has seen up to 8 men gather each week to discuss spiritual principles. This is allowing an opportunity to explore forgiveness, beliefs, generational patterns and other topics which impact on the lives of each individual, and through the helpful discussions arising each week, there is an opportunity for vulnerability, peer support and personal growth. The men who are engaging have been thriving, and have enjoyed learning through the biblical content that is shared.

Faith Food Fun continues to be a positive event on our monthly calendar. While the numbers vary, we have seen an increase and engaged with new faces who have come in to contact with North Ayr TheGither through other avenues and activities. Visiting speakers and crafters have helped keep things fresh and exciting, and this event is always well received. Everyone is welcome, so do feel free to come along and join us for a bite to eat and a cuppa on the second Saturday of every month!

In recent weeks we have been back in Ayr Academy working alongside Room Sixty in engaging and supporting boys in S1 as they transition.

We are grateful to South Ayrshire Council for the funding we received to support families in the North Ayr area throughout the winter to help with the cost of living crisis. This allowed us to support around 100 households by providing fuel, clothing, and food assistance.

We are also grateful to VASA and the Scottish Government for the funding which has supported our men's activities. This has allowed us to offer 2 weekly groups, 1-1 supports and outings including a tour of Ibrox, Celtic Park and attendance at a football match in Middlesbrough. Many men have engaged in these activities and

reported them as being the highlight of their week. To finish, here are some quotes from the men;

'I have been isolated and alone for so long, I am so grateful to have finally found a place where I have felt accepted and belong'

'I have had over 30 NHS appointments that I just couldn't bring myself to attend. Having met Paul for some 1-1 support, he empowered me to come along to the gym group, and now I am there every week – something I could never have committed to before. I have even started going to some of the other activities too...'

Having seen the impact these activities are having on the health and wellbeing on men in the north Ayr area, we are delighted to have received confirmation from Foundation Scotland that we were successful in receiving a grant, which will allow this work to continue.

The weeks seem to fly by, and we manage to pack a lot into our Brownie meetings! We made a good start to the new year by welcoming two new Brownies into our Unit. We talked about the Chinese New Year - this year it is the Year of the Rabbit. We played a 'Bunny Hop' game, and had a Rabbit Quiz finding out some new facts about rabbits. Everyone took home a little chocolate rabbit and a Chinese fortune cookie.

We also celebrated Burns Night and worked out that Robert Burns is 264! We played a 'Chase The Haggis' relay game by flapping a paper haggis along the floor with a rolled up newspaper. Then we danced 'Brown Owl's Haggis Dance' which wore us all out! We sang Auld Lang Syne, and everyone received a Happy Burns Night card.

The Brownies have started a new Girlguiding theme badge called 'Have Adventures', which is all about outdoor skills. We have



chosen a mascot for our new theme – Rupert Bear, who is famous for having adventures, and each week one Brownie gets to take a toy Rupert Bear home and have some adventures with him to tell us about. The Brownies had lots of fun playing a 'Roll-a-Rupert' game. We have been finding out about Rupert – he is 103 years old!

Did you know that one of his illustrators lived in Girvan? Many of the stories about Rupert include three Girl Guides – if you have ever read Rupert Bear stories, can you remember their names? (Pauline, Beryl and Janet). There is a huge willow sculpture of Rupert by the Duck Pond at Rozelle.





As part of our badge work, one week our District Commissioner Janis Meredith came along and got the girls to put up a tent in the correct order – and then take it down again, also in the correct order!


The girls thoroughly enjoyed this, and several local residents stopped to have a look at why a tent was being

put up on the grass outside the Church! We played a relay game involving things you would and wouldn't take camping – there was a lot of discussion about whether you would or wouldn't take your favourite cuddly toy with you!



Another week we played an obstacle course game about an imaginary adventurous trip up a snow covered mountain which involved slotting our hands over our eyes to make 'snow vision goggles', then finding our way around rocks (chairs), lakes (hoops), over the river (blue scarf), into the cave (under table), through a snow storm (Young Leader with water sprayer!), over the wobbly bridge (warped plank) and back down the mountain on the ski lift (a

ride on well, we better not tell you, or we might get told not to do it again!!)



We also worked towards the Brownie Aviation badge by making a list of 40 things that can fly – you could try that too! Then we made up model planes from kits and measured how far they could fly, and we also made little paper bluetit birds for the Garden Birdwatch

weekend. We made origami

frogs and played a game called 'Fox Frog Flea' which was a bit like 'Rock Paper Scissors', and we also acted out the stages of the life cycle of a butterfly.





For Valentines Day we made Heart Hugs out of card. Another week we had a Stamp Night which earned them their Brownies Collecting badge. Each Brownie came up with a theme or chose a country, and put together a page of stamps. These will be sent off for a national

junior stamp competition. We played a game called 'You've Got Mail' and sang 'I sent a letter to my friend, And on the way I dropped it, One of you must pick it up, And put it in your pocket'. At home-time everyone got a stamp album and some stamps to take home, kindly donated by Stamp Active (www.stampactive.co.uk) and the Ayrshire Philatelic Society.



Most of the Brownies were able to join a World Thinking Day event held for Girlguiding Ayrshire South in Troon. Coaches were put on to take us all there, and they had a great day with lots of activities on an environment theme including crafts, games, singing, potting seeds, handling mini

zoo animals, learning about bees and honey – and meeting lots of other Brownies from all over South Ayrshire.

For Mother's Day or Special Lady Day, the Brownies decorated a teapot card and taped a 'Relaxing' tea bag inside, and they all promised to help make their Special Lady a lovely cup of tea (with supervision pouring the hot water!) They also decorated a glass jar and put a battery tea light inside, and tied on a label saying 'You Light Up My Life'.

As a special treat, one week we had a visit to Ayr Fire Station! The girls were very excited about this. The Brownies had a chance to sit inside the fire engine, and the fire fighters put the flashing lights on for them. Then we had a good look around the engines and were shown all the tools and firefighting equipment that is cleverly stored on pull-out shelves — it's amazing what they have! The Brownies had a go at holding the heavy metal cutters — they could only just about lift them! We also found out that the Fire Department has a rescue boat as well as other vans and vehicles besides fire engines.

We were shown a very well equipped gym for the fire fighters to stay strong, fit and healthy; we saw their meeting room, a computer room, and even a library. Next we went into the canteen area where the fire fighters take it in turns to cook for all the others! We saw a recreation room with a snooker table and table tennis and board games and other activities, and then we were shown the

dormitories which had cubicles for each fire fighter. There was another separate dormitory, and they told us that was for the snorers!

We saw the top of the fireman's pole, and the fire fighters came sliding down.

After that we went outside, and the fire fighters brought the fire engines out into the yard and pulled out the hoses, and each Brownie got a turn at holding and turning on the powerful hose and trying to hose a bollard on the other side of the yard – it was great fun! At the end we said a big Brownie Thank You to the brave fire fighting team and gave them a box of chocolate biscuits which they were very pleased with. All the Brownies received a fire safety handout to take home as well as a fire engine badge – and there were even enough badges to give to the fire fighters as well! It was a great adventure.

A huge thank you to all the volunteers who help at Brownies, and for the support from everyone at the Church.

Saturday 6th May was the date of the Coronation of King Charles III. The Celebration started with a procession from Buckingham Palace to Westminster Abbey. King Charles and Queen Camilla travelled in the Diamond Jubilee State Coach escorted by mounted police and members of the armed forces.

Within the Abbey more than 2,200 of the great and good had arrived to witness this momentous occasion. These included members of the Royal Family, Political Leaders, Faith Leaders and representatives from some Commonwealth countries. Also present were famous faces from music, film and TV, charity representatives and local heroes.

The ceremony began at 11am and was presided over by the Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby. During the ceremony the King moved to the Coronation Chair also known as St. Edward's Chair. The chair was made somewhere between 1297 and 1300 by the order of King Edward I and was designed to enclose the Stone of Destiny, which had been taken from near Scone in Scotland. Previously the stone had been encased within the seat of a royal coronation chair at Scone. At this point screens were erected round the chair for the sacred anointing of the King with oil.

After the anointing the King was then presented with the Sovereign's Orb, Coronation Ring, Sovereign's Sceptre with Cross and Sovereign's Sceptre with Dove. Then at 12:01pm the Archbishop placed St. Edward's crown on the King's head and the Abbey bells rang for two minutes, trumpets sounded and gun salutes were fired.

The King then moved to his throne and took homage from the Prince of Wales. Traditionally this would have been done by a

succession of royals and peers but this was a slimmed down Coronation. The Archbishop then invited those in attendance and people listening or watching at home to pledge allegiance by saying the words: "I swear that I will pay true allegiance to your Majesty, and to your heirs and successors according to law. So help me God."

Queen Camilla then had Queen Mary's crown placed on her head and was also enthroned.

The service concluded with the King and Queen taking Holy Communion.

Before departing the King and Queen entered St. Edward's Chapel behind the altar and St. Edward's Crown which is reserved only for coronations was replaced with the Imperial State Crown.

The King and Queen then travelled back to Buckingham Palace in the 1762 Gold State Coach. The Princess Royal joined other Colonels-in-Chief riding behind the coach. The Prince and Princess of Wales and their three children followed behind in a second coach with other royals following in a further two carriages.


The King and Queen on arrival back at Buckingham Palace received a Royal Salute from the military personnel who had been on parade. At 2:30pm the Royal Party gathered on the balcony to acknowledge and greet the crowds and watch the fly past. Unfortunately due to poor weather conditions this had been drastically scaled back and only helicopters and the Red Arrows were able to fly over.


